Background/Context	<p>Topic is clearly related to research about teaching and learning in post-secondary education</p> <p>Background (prior research and rationale) and context (recent scholarly, including SoTL and disciplinary, and local context) of the research is clearly represented</p>	
Research design	<p>Research questions(s) or objectives(s) are clearly stated</p> <p>Theoretical, conceptual, or analytical framework is stated if used</p> <p>Rationale for using this research design is supported with appropriate citations from literature (qualitative, quantitative, longitudinal, ethnographic, etc.)</p> <p>Methods are clearly stated (sampling, sample size, data collecting, variables, data analysis)</p> <p>Ethics information included, if necessary</p> <p>Development of study or research is clearly laid out</p> <p>Purpose of study, hypothesis, or research question is accurately represented</p> <p>Conclusion and implications are presented and strong</p>	

<p>Overall Poster Design</p>	<p>Poster is visually appealing, and professional appearance and organization</p> <p>Poster is easy to read (layout and fonts) and provides thoughtful organization of information from intro to conclusion and references</p> <p>Topic is clear</p> <p>Fonts, headings, colours, white space, tables, figures, quotes, and diagrams are used effectively</p> <p>Communication style is accessible to a broad audience; includes a QR code[1]</p>
